MAD IN NEW ZEALAND

Granted, you may have seen this wild machine before, but you won't have seen it on the road. The Subaru Impreza STI-based **Brough Extreme Vehicles Subzilla** is now officially road-legal and therefore now available to customer order. Just bring your goggles

What the hell is that thing?

'Absolutely insane' is the obvious answer, but the proper answer is something more along the lines of the Brough Subzilla.

The back-shed creation of Waikato man Ken Brough, the Subzilla is created by throwing away all of the bits of a Subaru Impreza WRX STI that don't directly contribute to it going fast. The STI's drivetrain and boxer turbo engine are jammed into a custom-built chassis that is draped with a cursory body to produce one of the most outrageous creations to turn a wheel on New Zealand roads.

Are you trying to say that it's actually road legal?

Yes, although it's taken a while. Brough has battled with bureaucracy for some time, but got the Subzilla certified a few months back, meaning that he can now enjoy his creation on the roads around his Pirongia home.

So you could theroetically order one of vour own?

If you have a sense of adventure and a wallet flexible enough to indulge your fantasies. A basic Subzilla like Brough's first effort will set you back around \$95,000. That compares favourably with a Lotus 7 replica, or something like an Ariel Atom, although none of the potential opposition offer four-wheel drive. Or the Subzilla's feral boxer-engine howling when you let it loose.

But what's it really like to drive?

In a single word: overwhelming, Okay, two words: brilliantly overwhelming. Brough quotes a 0-100km/h time of 4.7 seconds, but it feels far faster, because you are exposed to, well, everything really.

Nail the small throttle to the bare metal floor and every sense is ruthlessly battered by noise, wind and the sheer aggression of the acceleration. You feel like you are sitting high in the surprisingly roomy cockpit, but only because the bodywork is so low. You are, in reality, mere centimetres off the ground, strapped into blue Brough-emblazoned racing seats. Absolutely everything is amplified. Remember, this car weighs just 750kg and has 210kW.

So fast! Surely it's utterly terrifying through the corners?

The stripped-out look, brutal acceleration and raucous noise would suggest a machine that is tricky to drive, but in reality it isn't particularly difficult to drive the Subzilla at sensible speeds. Of course, with a car like this the definition of 'sensible' is reset somewhat.
